The Eugene Asher Distinguished Teaching Award

Gene Asher embraced leadership in education, and even helped to adopt a fledgling young journal called *The History Teacher*. He was instrumental in establishing the Society for History Education, which now partners with the American Historical Association to recognize excellence in history teaching with the Asher Award.

The Asher Award, established in 1986, recognizes outstanding teaching and advocacy for history teaching at two-year, four-year, and graduate colleges and universities. The Society for History Education shares sponsorship of the award with the American Historical Association.

The Richard & Louise Wilde Student Award

Dick and Louise Wilde loved history education—and *The History Teacher*—and established a fund to support the journal and students considering careers in history education. Numerous prizes and paid internships have been offered to promising history students thanks to the Wildes.

The Wilde Award invites applications from students at California State University, Long Beach in master's, credential, and advanced undergraduate programs with a strong interest in pedagogy, specifically in teaching history. The recipient receives a year-long internship with the editorial board of *The History Teacher*.





National History Day Winning Student Essays

National History Day is a year-long program in which students in grades six through twelve research topics related to an annual theme and compete in district or regional contests. The top winners advance to the state contests, and the competition culminates with the National History Day finals.

Since 1998, *The History Teacher* has published the winning papers from the Junior and Senior divisions of the National History Day contest. These phenomenal essays appear in the November edition of the journal, showcasing the impact that history teachers have in shaping the next generation of young historians.

he History Teacher publishes articles of three general types: (1) reports on promising new classroom techniques, educational programs, curricula, and methods of evaluating instructional effectiveness; (2) analyses of important interpretations, leading historians, historiographical problems, and recent trends in specific fields of historical research; and (3) critical review essays on audiovisual materials, textbooks, and other secondary works suitable for classroom use.

The History Teacher also publishes, as regular departments, reviews of audiovisual materials, books, supplementary readers, and other printed classroom materials, with evaluations of their scholarly reliability, formats, and effectiveness of presentation. Reviews are commissioned in advance. Readers interested in contributing reviews should advise the Editor of their qualifications and fields of specialization.

Manuscripts must be double-spaced, formatted with endnotes in Chicago/Turabian style, and submitted in triplicate or electronically. Manuscripts do not have a specific word limit, but the Editorial Board may recommend that longer manuscripts be separated into shorter pieces if it best serves the scholarship. *The History Teacher* asks authors to remove or redact their names and other specific identifying information in manuscripts under review. Authors are encouraged to supply or recommend visual learning aids and illustrations that would enhance the effectiveness of their published work.

All manuscripts submitted to *The History Teacher* are run through anti-plagiarism software. If you are unsure of what constitutes plagiarism, please contact the editors for more information. Manuscripts that have already been published or are under consideration for publication elsewhere cannot be accepted.

Final decisions on manuscripts usually require a minimum of 8-12 weeks. We cannot return articles that have not been accepted unless a self-addressed, stamped envelope is enclosed with the article. The editors, who are the final judges of matters concerning grammar, usage, and other conventions, will edit contributions to conform to the standard manner of presentation in *The History Teacher*.
